Stops at Travelers Rest, Furman University, and Mauldin will introduce attendees to colorful local businesses, driving home the impact of recreation and quality-of-life investments as a core component of a wealth creation strategy. On this tour, we will hear from a variety of people who have had a hand in the development of the trail and related trail-based developments. Lunch will be provided at the Swamp Rabbit Café and we will end the tour with a happy hour at the BridgeWay Brewery.
